Dear brothers and sisters,

At the beginning of last week's podcast, I spoke about the conflict in Ukraine and called for a welcome to those who will be coming to this country as refugees. It is so important for us to continue our prayers for peace – in Ukraine and in those other parts of the world torn apart by conflict. On the 25 March – the Feast of the Annunciation – the Holy Father will be consecrating Ukraine and Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, calling on the intercession of Our Blessed Mother for peace. This will be an important day for us all to join the Holy Father in this act of prayer.

Please continue to be ready to welcome the refugee. Information about this effort is available on our diocesan website and I do ask you to continue your support for CAFOD in its work in bringing aid to Ukraine.

This Sunday's first reading finds Moses' experience of God's call to him from the burning bush. Moses recognised that he was on holy ground. He responded to the presence of God with humility and was open to God's call. It was a call to a task for which he felt unqualified. He needed assurance – and God provided the words that would enable Moses to go to the people of Israel in the midst of their sufferings and despite their hardness of heart.

How often do we feel daunted by the circumstances in which we live – certainly daunted by the news that we are seeing at present and seeking the best way to assist our brothers and sisters in need. We must know that God, who is compassion and love, will give us all that we need.

In this wonderful season of Lent, we are called to examine our lives, our consciences. We recognise our failings, our sinfulness, our weakness, our need for repentance – yet we do so with the greatest confidence, for – as Jesus tells us in the parable of the fig tree – God our Father wants us to be His. He will give us the opportunity to change, to produce the fruit that can only come through our openness to His love – the love that we see in His Son.

Let us be confident, then, for the love that comes to us in Christ overcomes all things and enables us to carry out all that is demanded of us as His disciples.

**Ukraine Fundraising Message to Parishes:** People across our faith community have been deeply affected by the conflict in Ukraine, with Holy Hours and prayers for peace offered across our many parishes.

Since the start of the war more than 2 million people have been forced to leave their homes including, according to UNICEF, a number of children travelling alone. Many diocesan parishes and schools have already undertaken fundraising initiatives for Ukraine, with others enquiring about the steps they might take to help our brothers and sisters at this extremely difficult time.

Giving to established registered charities with experience of delivering humanitarian aid in challenging environments is often the most efficient and helpful way to support those in need. In light of this, and following advice from Bishops' Conference (CBCEW), Bishop Richard recommends parishes wishing to give financially support CAFOD, who are part of the UK Disasters Emergency Committee response to the conflict and have experienced charitable partners already working in Ukraine. ## **POPE FRANCIS' PRAYER FOR PEACE IN THE UKRAINE: [\(240\) Pope recites special prayer for end to war in Ukraine - YouTube](#)**

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Here is the CNS translation of the prayer for peace Pope Francis recited at his weekly general audience March 16. The prayer was composed by Archbishop Domenico Battaglia of Naples.

Forgive us for the war, Lord.

Lord Jesus, Son of God, have mercy on us sinners.

Lord Jesus, born under the bombs of Kyiv, have mercy on us.

Lord Jesus, dead in the arms of a mother in Kharkiv, have mercy on us.

Lord Jesus, in the 20-year-olds sent to the frontline, have mercy on us.

Lord Jesus, who continues to see hands armed with weapons under the shadow of the cross, forgive us, Lord.

Forgive us, if, not content with the nails with which we pierced your hand, we continue to drink from the blood of the dead torn apart by weapons.

Forgive us if these hands that you had created to protect have been turned into instruments of death.

Forgive us, Lord, if we continue to kill our brother. Forgive us, Lord, if we continue to kill our brother, if we continue like Cain to take the stones from our field to kill Abel.

Forgive us if we go out of our way to justify cruelty, if, in our pain, we legitimize the cruelty of our actions. Forgive us the war, Lord.

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, we implore you to stop the hand of Cain, enlighten our conscience, let not our will be done, do not abandon us to our own doing. Stop us, Lord, stop us, and when you have stopped the hand of Cain, take care of him also. He is our brother.

O Lord, stop the violence. Stop us, Lord. Amen.

**Dementia Week was last week, but we can still pray for those who suffer from dementia and their caregivers.**

**This Friday, 25 March, the Solemnity of the Annunciation and Incarnation of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, Pope Francis will consecrate the nation of Russia to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.**

This is in fulfillment of the request made by our Lady of Fatima through Sr. Lucia for the Pope in 13 June 1929.

As we did with our parish at the conclusion of the Year of Mary, the consecration places Russia into the hands of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. What does this mean? First, it will bestow graces on the Russians and all who live there to accept the Catholic Faith revealed by the Son of Mary. For those who believe, there will be graces that will deepen their Faith and inspire them to live the message of Fatima: praying the Rosary (i.e. meditating on Scripture), making sacrifices both spiritually and materially, giving alms, attending Church more frequently for Mass and Confession (Five first Saturdays in reparation against the 5 sins committed against Mary, i.e. denial of the Immaculate Conception, of her Divine Motherhood, of her Perpetual Virginity, of her glorious Assumption, body and soul, into Heaven, and desecration of her images.) The Rosary helps us with Divine grace to meditate on these mysteries. Honouring her images is something we learned to do since we were children.

Mary tells us that the conversion of Russia will bring about a huge change in world history. Certainly, that change would have occurred years ago if that nation had not adopted communism for its political system after the horrendous Russian Revolution around the time of the First World War.

It is important that the entire Church participate in this Consecration by praying to Mary with the Rosary, Hail Mary, Memorare or any of the many prayers the Church has composed to venerate her as God wants her to be venerated.

*Preparatory Novena Prayer for the Consecration of Russia and the Ukraine  
To the Immaculate Heart of Mary by Pope Francis  
25 March 2022*

*O Immaculate Heart of Mary, Holy Mother of God, and our most tender mother. Look down upon the distress in which the Church and all humanity finds itself due to the spread of godlessness, materialism and the persecution of the Catholic Faith, errors of which you warned in Fatima.*

*You are the Mediatrix of all graces. Obtain for us the grace that all the bishops of the world, in union with Pope Francis, may consecrate Russia and Ukraine to your Immaculate Heart on 25 March 2022. By this consecration we hope --- as you told us at Fatima --- that at a time appointed by God, Russia will be converted, and mankind will be granted an era of peace. We hope that by this consecration the triumph of your Immaculate Heart will soon draw near and the Church will be authentically renewed in the splendour of the purity of the Catholic Faith, the sacredness of the liturgy and the holiness of the Christian life.*

*O Queen of the Holy Rosary and our most tender Mother, turn your merciful eyes toward Pope Francis, the bishops and each of us and graciously hear our fervent.  
AMEN.*
