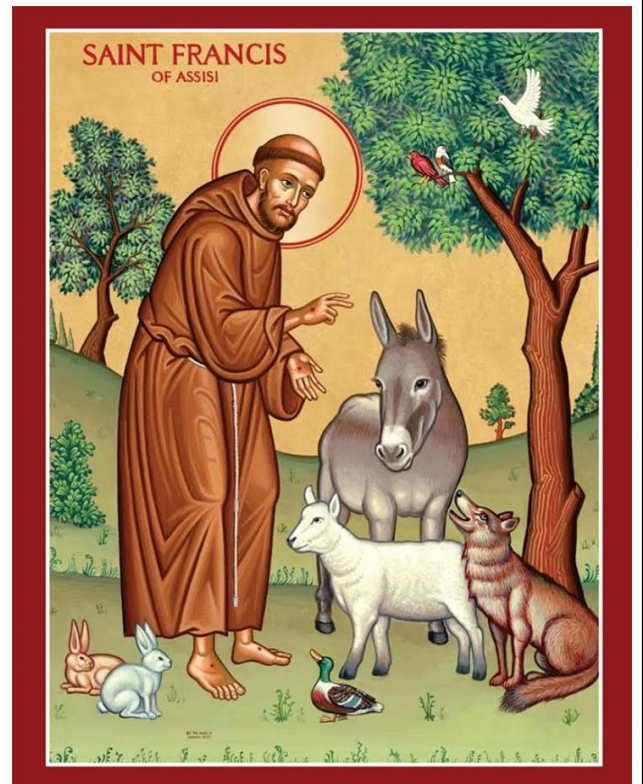

Our Lady of the Rosary.

According to the Dominicans, in the early 1200's, St. Dominic had a vision of the Blessed Virgin Mary who gave him the Rosary to use as a tool to fight the heretics and to fight against the devil.

The Rosary has its roots in the 150 psalms where people who couldn't read began praying 150 Hail Marys instead. In the 16th century, the Rosary prayer developed to include the contemplation of the 5 joyful, 5 sorrowful, and 5 glorious mysteries. The 5 Mysteries of Light were added to the Rosary in 2002, by Saint Pope John Paul II.



The Blessed Martyrs of Sussex

On 3rd October, the Church honours ten martyrs from the county of Sussex (East and West), whose sufferings span the whole period during which men and women were put to death in England for their loyalty to the Catholic faith: a period of over a hundred and forty years, during the reigns of five monarchs. Among them are four laymen, two of noblemen, and six priests, including a Benedictine monk, a Franciscan friar, and three "seminary priests".
