Gospel message of Forgiveness

Today's story of the unforgiving servant is very powerful and straight to the point. How can we expect God to forgive us if we are not forgiving? After all as we say on a daily basis as we pray in the words our Lord gave us—"forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us". But this is often easier said than done, when we face humiliation, insult or some form of loss at the hands of another.



But the act of forgiveness is such an important aspect of our life's desire of becoming more Christ like. An important part of forgiving others is the act of humility that this entails. At the beginning of each gathering as a community at Mass on Sunday, we ask each other to forgive our sins as we acknowledge the reality that we are all sinners—yes, we all get it wrong, no one is perfect- only the good Lord (Mk 10:18). So are we really in a position to throw the first stone? (Jn 8:7) (cont over)

The heart close shut against the light.


Forgive the love that could endure

Why Forgiveness? (continued)

Secondly the act of forgiveness is also an acknowledgement on our part that our own forgiveness, our own salvation has come at an ultimate cost—the sacrifice of the Son of God on the Cross. God's desire to draw us to Himself, was sealed by the Pascal Sacrifice, because that is how much He loves us all. Can we find the strength of heart to forgive others for their mistakes when Christ gave his very self, for the sake of our mistakes?

Finally, it's important to remember that forgiveness is not about forgetting. But it is about letting go of the pain and anger that is a result of being hurt or affronted by someone else. It is this pain and anger that leads us to resentment and that resentment can burrow into our very soul, drawing our thoughts away from the free gift of love God has given us and drawing our thoughts and minds down to the worldly emotions steeped in the desire for revenge.

Our act of forgiveness is therefore an acknowledgement of the sacrifice that God made for us, an acceptance that we are all sinners and we all get it wrong, as Christ teaches us. It liberates us from personal pain and suffering and is an act of humility as we embrace the reality that the strength to be able to forgive others is a grace and gift of love from God to us all.
