The Unclean must live outside the camp

Isn't it a sad reality that each time we turn on the news, we see the reality that the prejudice and bias in today's Old Testament reading is still at the heart of so many of the world's actions and foreign policy today just as they were over 3000 years ago.

Fear, prejudice, greed and pride drive much of the world's economic models. Policies abound across the globe to keep refugees from the doors of the wealthy nations, (wealth often made from the exploitation and removal of natural resources and indigenous wealth of others), are slammed in their faces, with the words "unclean, unclean" ringing in their ears.

And yet it is in this mix that Jesus comes to show us the true meaning of humanity by curing the afflictions of the outcast with a simple act of love and kindness and two simple words "be cured!"

Jesus comes to bring hope to all humanity and the true meaning of life that is love. And to receive this love and the guidance to find the narrow path of righteousness (Mt 7:13) we simply need to acknowledge our brokenness and to turn to Christ in humility and faith and simply say "you can cure me".

And in so many ways this is the lesson of Lent. Christ is showing us as He journeys to the cross that He is making this journey and sacrifice, because He knows we need to be cured—and our part? We simply need to acknowledge the fact, overcome our pride, and ask.



Just a thought....


What is the difference between calling ourselves Christian and living a Christian life?

For I am not seeking my own good but the good of many, so that they may be saved. Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ. " (1 Cor 10:31-11;1).
