God will provide

Last Sunday, we were reminded, by the prophet Jeremiah, that God will always be with us and that He will provide a shepherd to guide His people to the path that will lead us to eternity.



Today we see this promise being fulfilled as Jesus feeds and shows us the path to salvation, through the acts of self sacrifice and caring for those who have nothing of their own. In Matthew, Mark and Luke, the focus of this scene is very firmly on Jesus as the shepherd of God, while in John's Gospel, he also alludes to the time when Moses feeds the people with the manna from heaven, while in they were lost in the wilderness. Christ is the new Moses to lead the people back to God, the promised land, back to the new Eden.

The imagery surrounding the feeding of the five thousand is a prophetic foretelling of the Eucharist which is to come, following its instigation at the last supper. Christ provides physical and spiritual nourishment for those who acknowledge that He is the Son of God, those who seek the path to God. Through our act of faith we are nourished on the very body and blood of our saviour. But through the presence of the baskets of scraps, we are also reminded that there are no limits to God's generosity, to the overflowing abundance that is God's free and unconditional gift of His love for us all.

Just a thought...

The Eucharist, like all the great mysteries of our faith, is not something that one can explain rationally. How can Jesus, how can God, be contained in what appears to be a small wafer of bread? But that's our strong belief, that Jesus is truly present on our altars. Once we have received him in the Eucharist, He is present in our very persons, in our bodies. We believe that by the reception of the Eucharist we become tabernacles, with our Lord dwelling within our very selves. What a glorious mystery! And it's embracing the sense of mystery and , miracle that we approach the Eucharist with; that deep awareness, that deep faith, that deep belief.



It is with this conscious awareness of the miraculous gift of the Eucharist, that we have introduced Adoration for 30 minutes before the 10.45 Mass. A chance to prepare and to talk to God about your personal intentions, seek spiritual guidance, or simply offer thanksgiving and adoration to God for the week that has just concluded. It's a wonderful opportunity to prepare our hearts to receive the love, strength, confidence, joy and forgiveness that we receive through the very body of Christ. Even just sitting in silence and allowing for God's presence to wash over you is both a blessing and a gift from our eternal Father.
