Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. (James 5:13)

Rejoice, rejoice God is always with us.

Jesus tells the crowd that John the Baptist is Elijah. But what does He mean?

Elijah was a central character in Jewish history and as a sign of their relationship with God. If we summarise the story from the Book of Kings, we see that Elijah is sent by God, he is sent to put right the suffering of the people at the hands of corrupt, selfish and greedy kings – to free God's people from the oppression of sinfulness. Elijah battles with the evil of false teachings and the worship of false gods, he cares for the poor and those living on the fringes of society and he performs miracles in God's name, healing the sick and feeding the starving. Elijah represents the message of God's intimate paternal love for all His people.

In many ways, we can see the similarities between Elijah and Jesus' mission and in fact when Christ asks His disciples on the road to Jerusalem "who do you say I am?" He is told "some say you are Elijah" (Mt 16:13-20). But today Christ uses the metaphor to tell the crowd that John the Baptist is Elijah. Affirming that John has been sent by God. Assuring those present that John had come to set the people free from the oppression of sin through baptism and the message of God's forgiveness. But Jesus is also reminding us that in all our suffering and worldly temptations, God is always with us. Travelling alongside us, providing us with all we need, showing us the way back to Him, where we belong.
