"Not a Kingdom of this world" (Jn18:36)

The Old Testament prophet Zechariah, who lived about 500 years before the birth of Jesus, gave a prophecy that the Messiah, "a salvific leader/liberator", would announce himself publicly in a most humble way - by riding a lowly donkey into Jerusalem (Zec 9:9-11).

When Zechariah gave this prophecy, there was no "Davidic" king in Jerusalem. The last king, Zedekiah, had been taken as captive to Babylon, where he later died as a prisoner, about a century before the time of the prophet Zechariah.

And throughout the turbulent history of the Jewish nation, the hope and longing for the return of the true King, from the line of David, who would come to restore the prosperity of the Jewish people became a deeply embedded cultural identity and desire. Herod after all had only been installed by the Romans as a puppet king.

And it is set in this context that Jesus, the meek, gentle and humble Christ (*christos* – chosen one) entered in glory into the city of Jerusalem. Not as a powerful warrior, with an army of battle hardened soldiers behind Him. But as a gentle, loving man, preaching the forgiveness and love of God.

And it is in this meek humility that Christ brings us to the pathway not of an earthly kingdom, but to the path that is the promise of the Kingdom of God, and the promise of eternity. He institutes the blessed sacrament that is the Eucharist and each Sunday, as the bread and wine becomes the very body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus, we are reminded of this glorious self sacrifice, and promise of eternity, through the Paschal Mystery.

As we conclude our personal reflection of Lent, we are brought to one last question. Are we, like the Jewish people looking for worldly power and success or do we welcome the King of Kings into our hearts as the meek, humble, loving example of God who is calling us constantly to the kingdom that is to come and has no end?

The symbolism of the palm in the Jewish tradition brings many layers of meaning, all of which the people of Jerusalem would have understood and embraced as they welcomed Christ into the city —

- The palm symbol in the Bible represents celebration, joy, and gratitude during the Old Testament's Feast of Tabernacles and signifies righteousness and strength in stories like that of Deborah.
- Repeatedly within the Psalms, palms symbolize spiritual vitality and endurance
- Spiritually, palm trees are linked with virtues such as righteousness, integrity, fruitfulness, and praise, embodying qualities desired in one's spiritual journey.
- The ancient world viewed palms as symbols of victory and triumph, which the Bible adapts to highlight Christ's ultimate victory over sin through His death and resurrection.

As we all know, within the Catholic Church, our Parish Priests do not receive a salary or stipend like in the C of E. They maintain themselves via a small weekly allowance from their parish for food and general expenses and twice a year the second collection goes directly to them to cover living costs, like insuring their car, clothing etc.
